




A displayable **Fox Deluxe Bock** Beer that apparently was initially opened with the "Jaws of Life" went for \$ 77.00

A Jumbo Alt Heidelberg Bock IRTP quart label from Columbia Breweries, Tacoma, WA. Sold for \$66.00.







A NEUWEILER'S BOCK TIN SIGN from the 50's measuring 18" x 36" in very good condition sold for \$31.51



## **Bock in the Rockies**

The bock labels featured in this issue's column come from the Butte Brewing Company of Butte, Montana and Great Falls Breweries, Inc. of Great Falls, Montana. Both labels are from the 1940s as they have the Internal Revenue Tax Paid statement on them. The Butte label is a stock design that was also used by other brewing companies in the US. This Butte Bock label is very similar in design to the one shown in the July 2004 *Goatzette* with the following differences. The major difference is the color scheme used on this label. The center stripe is a metallic gold (not black) and the bottom stripe is white (not yellow). There is also a 4% alcohol statement in fine print across the top of the label, above BOCK BEER and this is printed in the same metallic gold color. I suspect this label was produced prior to the one in the previous issue. I was fortunate to acquire the label this summer and I had not previously known it existed.




The Butte Brewery began selling beer to the thirsty miners of Butte in 1885. The name changed to the Butte Brewing Company in 1899. The business was in operation up to prohibition and reopened upon its repeal in the early 1930s. The brewery survived another 30 years, closing for good in 1963. The Butte Brewing Corporation was the breweries name for the last few years of its existence.

The Great Falls Bock label has a metallic looking silver background. The goat seems to be happy to be on the label (perhaps glad a long cold Montana winter has come to an end) as he has a big smile across his face. The neck label also features the same smiling goat but the horns are slightly different than on the main bottle label.

The Great Falls Breweries, Inc. was the brewery name after prohibition was repealed, from 1933-1968. The brewries name was Sick's Great Falls Breweries, Inc. during the mid 1940s. Within the red banner is the phrase "It's the Flavor" which I believe originated prior to the Sick name being associated with the brewery. This is another label which was acquired with the above Butte Bock and one that is not seen with any frequency, even in Montana.



## Goasting with Goats

This issue continues the review of newer and microbrewery bock beer coasters. If anybody has any older bock coasters, or variations of those already discussed, please let me know as I'd like to get them featured in this column.

The first set of bock beer coasters are from Texas. The Lone Star Natural Bock coaster is a 3.5" in diameter and single sided. This coaster is listed as TX-LON-38 in the Texas Coaster Guide in the Beer Coaster Mania web site listed below. According to this web site, the Lone Star Brewery is still in operation.





The second Texas bock coaster is the Texas Crude Bock, identified as TX-DAL-9, from the now closed Texas Brewing Co. in Dallas (opened in 1992). This coaster is 4" in diameter and has advertising for Texas Crude Accessories (like T-shirts, hats, etc.) along with the brewing company web site printed on the back side. The fine print around the border of this coaster says "Texas Brewing Co. has recaptured the independent spirit of the Texas wildcatter in a hand-crafted premium

bock beer. Texas Crude is a full bodied bock with a smooth texture brewed from the finest quality hops and deep roasted specialty malts. We invite you to re-live the spirited adventure of those who discovered "black gold," the wealth of the Texas soil."

The last bock coaster for this issue comes from the Signature Beer Company of St. Louis, Missouri. It is now closed (opened in 1992). This coaster is identified as MO-SIG-4 in the web based coaster guide. It is 4" square and single sided.

# Fact Or Fiction Can Surfaces at Canvention Steve Gordon

For years, there has been a Rheingold Bock can that has been unpictured in any reference book I know. The only place it ever was pictured was in an early Will Anderson beer book. The can was a Rheingold Genuine Bock, unremarkable in its own right, except that this can was *IRTP*.



The Bible, BCU, Class Book, and the USBC all overlooked the can. It appears on the master list for the USBC as Can # 3149, and is marked as found and photographed, but for some reason it never made it into the book.



Now, it is found again, as it was in a dealer's totes at the Canvention. Our Editor is hard to impress, but his eyes popped when he saw the can! I am pleased to share it with my fellow Bocksters.

## CALIFORNIA BOCK CANS

For the beer can collector, collecting California beer cans is quite challenging when one considers the vast number of cans produced in the state. With so much variety and variations, and then couple that with rareness of many brands, it's almost impossible to collect them all.

If there was one area where California is lacking, it has to be bock beer cans. I count only 9 brand names from the 1950s to the 1960s. California was a late- comer to putting bock beer into cans, and I do not know of any IRTP can produced. Why Grace Brothers never put bock in cans before WW2 is hard to fathom, as they made plenty of ales. This is hard to believe, as they were one of the most prolific brewers that canned beer before World War 2.



If there ever was a pre-war California brewer that did put bock beer in cans, it would probably be San Francisco Brewing Company, makers of Burgermeister Beer and Ale. Check out this label and it's not that far of a stretch to imagine they could have put this in cans; maybe someday someone will turn one up.

Below is the list of California bock flat top cans. I conferred with California specialist Roy Nelson on the rareness Values. You can contact Jim Romine for the composite listing. This article covers the bread and butter of California bock flat top cans. Please let me know of any glaring omissions. I don't know of any California bock cans that have "BOCK" stamped on the lid.

I will not include the dubious Pilsengold Bock, as I don't believe it was a real can. That can, and the story behind it, could be an article in itself (I would have to see at least a bottle label first to even think it was real!)

Missing would be Lucky Bock, as they did produce a bock product right from the start, but kept it in bottles.

Can 1 has no ounces TF, can 4 and 5 are alike but one has large writing BF and the other has small writing BF. Can 6 is Maier. The orange goat is not pictured because I do not have it.



Pabst Bock, once again because of the number of Pabst and Bock can collectors, the demand outweighs the supply. According to the composite, there is a can with Bock in red, but I've never seen it. USBC 109-3 (recently sold on Ebay for \$175) R-6 109-36 is easier because of a large indoor find of these that showed up at a LA ABA show a few years back, most had their tops cut out. R-5


Can't figure out USBC 109-37, a recent one showed up on Ebay and went for over \$240!!! (compare to the book value of \$12) Still R-6, but it did take me a long time to even find the dumper version.





Can 1 and 2 are Regal Amber Brewing, the rest are Regal Pale, can 3 has brewing info in cursive writing, can 4 has brewing info in block writing, can 6 also comes in enamel paint

Regal Pale 121-10-16,21. The first Regal bock can USBC is tough. R-7 Next would be 121-11 from Regal AMBER brewing company, my call is a R-7 on that one ,USBC 121-12-16 are out there and available all with R-4s, maybe the 11oz goes a little higher with a R-5 ranking, the


the aluminum top 121-21 has a R-7 ranking. Now there's an un-pictured Regal bock can similar to 121-21 without the "soft top" banner". The can in the photo is a zip, but it does exist in a flat top. I've seen the can in person at Blue Gray and Roy Nelson has another one. Roy tells me more are out there but with only 2 that I know of I give it a R-7.9 or higher.

Valley Brew Bock. I've upgraded 4 times before I aquired an on-grade one. A recent one was on a dealers list for \$2000 and it did sell!! R-7

Completing a California Bock collection is well within the realm of most beer can collectors, given they have a lot of patience, and in some cases deep pockets. There are no California Bock cans that are unique, and even the toughest ones rank no higher than an eight on the rareness scale.

## BAAAAADBOY'S GOATMATE OF THE MONTH
